FROM THE SMOKE FREE ROOM

The February 27, 2013, Board meeting was called to order at 7:06 p.m. by President Charlene Beckner. The meeting, held at the Fairfax City Public Library, was also attended by Clarice Shaw, Woody Williams, Bill Worsham, Phil Roche, Benny Leonard, Gil Beckner, Greg Shepherd, Bill Sims, Doug Tomb and Howard Minners.



President Charlene asked Gil to present the current financial status of the club. Gil also asked the Board to voice their opinion on an unfunded bill to cover operations of the GWC website through 2021, a letter from MAFFI asking the Club for a five-year funding commitment to help with the operations of the Model A museum, the Club purchase of raffle tickets for the 2013 MARC Meet, and the MAFCA request for a \$75 voluntary contribution for the Club liability insurance. The Board agreed to pay the invoice after the "hosting" period was reduced from eight to two years. A motion was made and passed to place a note in the *Script* advising all Club members that they cannot spend Club funds without prior approval. The Board voted to continue with the \$500 annual support of the Model A museum provided funds are available. Also approved was the purchase of \$50 worth of raffle tickets to support the Central Kentucky Club hosting the 2013 MARC Meet. The Board tabled the discussion on the insurance contribution pending receipt of a copy of the MAFCA insurance policy.

Bill Worsham presented the 50th Anniversary Committee's venue proposals. The committee will continue to research available dates.

Clarice reported April activities will include the Cherry Blossom Parade on April 13 and Small Parts' Day on April 27.

The meeting adjourned at 8:50 p.m.

THE GEORGE WASHINGTON CHAPTER 25 YEARS AGO

For the GWC, !988 was a landmark year—it was the chapter's 25th anniversary. Planning was under way in this month of March to commemorate the chapter's charter, dated May 11th, 1963. Shorter-term plans for the March program were intriguing. Members were asked to bring automobilia items and present them for a show-and-tell session. The extensive collections of some members which were known to exist, signs, "petroliana" (the gas station offshoot of automobilia), Model A ads, radiator ornaments, literature, and other



treasures would prove to be a treat for the membership to view and learn about. Eligible was almost anything associated with the auto, from script car keys to 10' tall visible gas pumps. (Well, the pumps would have been a bit impractical, none appeared).

On the Ford Script's cover was a picture of a very rare Model A, Jack Knowles' C & P Telephone Company installation truck, which originally served in Baltimore. The long-departed Jack was Model A all the way, having bought when new both a '29 roadster and a '31. The truck was acquired in 1960 when Jack was an active phone company employee. It received a meticulous restoration and for some time was displayed at the Car & Carriage Caravan Museum in Luray, Virginia. Eventually it was donated to the Smithsonian Institute. Later it appeared in Baltimore's Museum of Industry in a telephone exhibit, a fitting return to its city of original service. He was well known also for his Victoria, now in the hands of Jerry DeWitt. It should be noted that Jack Knowles was a key individual in the roots of our chapter. While president of a local club named Model A Club of America, it was he who led the members to become a chapter of MAFCA by creating the Potomac Chapter, which eventually blended into our George Washington Chapter.

What else was happening? John Dingle, a club leader in numerous ways for years, advised that since most of his activities now centered around far-away locations, he was stepping down from the Board. President Peyton Randolph announced that Cliff Meyers would replace him. Also, this month, Reed Martin joined our ranks.

The swap column offered treasures such as a Wells Cargo trailer, a '30 coupe, and a '61 Olds 88. There were wanteds too: a roadster or cabriolet, an Apco oil pressure gauge, and Val Zadnick needed front bumper brackets for his 2-door. He got 'em.

ALREADY BOOKED YOUR MODEL A MUSEUM DEDICATION HOTEL? READ THIS

The Grape Country Model A Region of MARC is running its annual Michigan Model A Round-Up the same weekend that MAFFI is holding its Model A Museum dedication. The Grape Country club negotiated special room rates for those attending its meet, but it appears that many people who are attending the museum dedication have been booking rooms in the hotels that the Grape Country club arranged to block out for its attendees under the impression that the rooms were blocked out for the MAFFI event. MAFFI did not negotiate a block of rooms with reduced rates for these hotels. The hotels affected by this confusion are the Four Points by Sheraton, which serves as the host hotel, the Holiday Inn Express, Best Western and Fairfield Inn East.

The negotiated rates are intended for those enthusiasts registered for the Michigan Model A Round-Up event and those who do not register for that event will not receive the rate negotiated by the Grape Country Model A Club. The difference between the negotiated rate and the hotel's rack rate is about \$100 per night.

The hotel registration desk will have a copy of the list of Michigan Model A Round-Up registrations and will approve the negotiated rate only for those individuals who are registered for the Michigan Model A Round-Up event. If you are only attending the Model A Museum dedication event, this is to warn you that your bill will be about \$100 per night more than you expect if you are registered at any of the hotels mentioned above.

If this cost increase will affect your decision about where to stay for the Model A Ford Museum event, this will give you time to either contact the hotel in which you are booked and find a less-expensive room or to cancel your reservation and book in another, less expensive hotel. Based on these mileages, we have two awards pending for 2012. Ashley Williams is due the 2000 mile award for her 1931 Fordor. Ashley is the youngest member of the GWC in the MARC Driving Awards Program. Tom Quigley is also due the 2000-mile award for his 1931 Victoria. Tom registered his car just before he got her on the road the first of the year and immediately took off on a cold ride to southern Virginia. You may remember reading about his adventures in the Script.

Cricket, Carol and I are looking forward to the 2013 driving year. Hopefully Cricket will have recuperated from her rear wheel bearing problem by then. (I still owe Bill Sims an article about the bearing thing.) We are thinking about attending the MARC National in Kentucky later in the year but certainly will be taking a spring trip of some kind to get Cricket back in shape.

The driving awards program is sponsored and administered by MARC and one of the requirements of the program is membership in that organization. All mileage accumulated throughout the year counts toward the program. However, mileage accumulated during years you are not a member of MARC does not count toward an award. Janice Barker, the National MARC Driving Awards Chairperson, uses the published MARC roster to determine membership. If a Club member drops their membership in MARC I do not carry them in the program, though I do maintain their previous data. Should they rejoin MARC, their mileage begins accumulating from their total the last year they were a member of MARC.

If you're planning on going to Kentucky or just participating in Club events this year, why not make your miles count by joining in the MARC Driving Awards program? To join, you must, as mentioned, be a member of MARC and pay a one-time registration fee of \$1.00 per car. Your car must be of original manufacture (1927-1931), be titled as a Model "A", and be authentic in that it should have an original type four cylinder engine (1927-1934) and have an original body style for year of manufacture. Awards begin at the 2,000-mile point, followed by 5,000 miles and every 5,000 miles thereafter. Come join the fun and make all those miles this year count. TREASURER'S REPORT

The Board asked me to remind all members that all expenditures made on behalf of the Club must be approved in advance. With the exception of funding already authorized in the approved budget, the President can approve expenditures of up to \$200 and the Board has approval authority up to \$2,000.
