Absent were: Doug Tomb, Greg Shepherd, Benny Leonard, Bill Worsham, Tom Quigley, and Jason Cunningham. A quorum was not present. Jamie Lucas attended as a guest.

**Minutes:** September BOD minutes approved and published in September *Script*.

### **President's report:**

1. **By Laws:** The by-law changes will be separately voted on at our annual Membership Meeting in November; discussed at last General Membership Meeting on October 18.
2. **Budget:** Projections for next year. Worksheet provided to all by email.
3. **Life Membership:** Two completed nominations. Committee to review will meet early next month.

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## **PROPOSED BYLAW CHANGES TO BE VOTED ON AT THIS MONTH'S MEETING**

Fellow GWC members. Times change, and your Board of Directors (BOD) believes we need to make two changes to our Bylaws to adjust to those changes.

Below are the two proposed changes for the review of the Club. We will vote on these proposed changes at our Annual Meeting this month.

This first change is to bring our Bylaws into consonance with the Code of Virginia with respect to proxy and electronic voting. The Code of Virginia that applies is Title 13.1. Corporations, Chapter 10, Virginia Nonstock Corporation Act, Section 13.1-847, Proxies.

The reason for this change is to allow for the possibility of a conference call or other electronic meeting of the BOD when weather or necessary absences preclude establishing a quorum as is necessary to conduct the business of the club. This change will also allow the BOD to achieve a quorum through the use of electronic voting methods when an insufficient number of members is physically present at the meeting location. For the purpose of this discussion, "electronic" means relating to technology having electrical, digital, magnetic, wireless, optical, electromagnetic, or similar capabilities.

This is how our Bylaws are currently written:

### CURRENT WORDING

Article VI

Meetings

Section V Quorum – A meeting, whether a regular membership or a special membership meeting, must have twenty percent of the listed voting membership present to constitute a quorum. For a Board of Directors meeting, a quorum will consist of two-thirds of the Board membership. Proxy votes are not permissible; members must be present to vote.

PROPOSED WORDING (Note: the proposed changes are highlighted in ***bold italics***).

Article VI

Meetings

Section V Quorum – A meeting, whether a regular membership or a special membership meeting, must have twenty percent of the listed voting membership present, ***or represented by proxy or remotely cast votes***, to constitute a quorum. For a Board of Directors meeting, a quorum will consist of two-thirds of the Board membership. Proxy ***or remotely cast votes are permissible for regular membership, special membership and all Board of Directors meetings in accordance with the Code of Virginia (Title 13.1. Corporations, Chapter 10, Virginia Nonstock Corporation Act, Section 13.1-847. Proxies)***.

The following is the language in the Code of Virginia that applies to our Bylaws:

### **§ 13.1-847. Proxies.**

A. A member entitled to vote may vote in person or, unless the articles of incorporation or bylaws otherwise provide, by proxy.

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## PROPOSED BYLAW CHANGES (Cont.)

B. A member or the member's agent or attorney-in-fact may appoint a proxy to vote or otherwise act for the member by signing an appointment form or by an electronic transmission. Any copy, facsimile telecommunications or other reliable reproduction of the writing or transmission created pursuant to this subsection may be substituted or used in lieu of the original writing or transmission for any and all purposes for which the original writing or transmission could be used, provided that such copy, facsimile telecommunication or other reproduction shall be a complete reproduction of the entire original writing or transmission.

The second change is intended to give guidance to the Club in the event it becomes necessary to disestablish the Club sometime in the future. This is important since we are a not-for-profit organization, and the distribution of our assets must be made in accordance with both state and federal law to prevent incurring tax liabilities.

The Code of Virginia that applies is (Title) § 13.1-902. Dissolution by directors and members, and § 13.1-907. Distribution and plan of distribution of assets.

We believe it would be prudent to add, under Article IX, Property, the following new section:

Section IV. Dissolution. Should the Board determine that dissolution of the club is in the best interest of its remaining membership, they shall proceed in accordance with the Code of Virginia, Title 13.1. Corporations, Chapter 10, Virginia Nonstock Corporation Act, Section 13.1-902. Dissolution by directors and members, and Section 13.1-907. Distribution and plan of distribution of assets.

Rationale: the purpose of inserting this new section is to provide guidance in the bylaws to future Boards of Directors on the steps necessary for the possible future dissolution of the Club. We need to insert this language so that it is clear that there are specific conditions imposed upon us by the Commonwealth of Virginia should the time come when we feel we need to dissolve the Club. The Code of Virginia may change over time, so simply inserting the reference as a reminder to future members is sufficient. However, we believe now is the time to begin developing a reasonable exit strategy.

The White's Ferry/Sugarloaf Mountain tour on October 28 was a smashing success! Keith Randall brought along his beautiful 1936 Ford V8 Roadster, and Don Pauly joined the trip in his immaculate 1941 V12 Lincoln Continental, previously owned by Mr.F.W. Woolworth of department store fame.

Jim Gray once again did a fantastic job leading the Virginia crew up to White's Ferry from Chantilly. For many folks, the quaint experience of crossing the river on the historic ferry was a thrill in itself. After a pause to stretch the legs and completely assemble at the ferry parking lot, the convoy of 12 cars slowly headed towards historic Poolesville, MD, and route 28.

Our first stop was Lewis Orchard – a small, family-run orchard with fantastic pies, juicy apples, and a variety of preserves and local produce. After a little shopping, one jumped back in the car for our next stop: the Monocacy River Aqueduct.



The now-dry aqueduct is part of the C&O Canal system and allowed barges to pass over the Monocacy River. After parking the cars, we strolled our way across the Aqueduct and enjoyed the view from the top. We stopped for photos and enjoyed a few laughs and learned about the Aqueduct's interesting Civil War history.

From there, the long line of cars snaked their way through Dickerson, MD, and to the base of Sugarloaf Mountain.

From that point, we headed south on route 15 in Virginia back towards Leesburg. Our route took us through Lucketts, where we stopped for a little shopping.


From there, everyone headed for home, happy, tired, and with the cherry glow of having fully enjoyed one of the last truly marvelous autumn days of the year.
