THE GEORGE WASHINGTON CHAPTER 25 YEARS AGO

In the President's column, Pres. Clem said June was an exciting month because it was Sully time, everyone was encouraged to come out and participate, there were a lot of jobs to be done. Members were reminded to wear club paraphernalia proudly. Editor Bill gave forth with a story of an elusive short circuit in his Town Sedan. Joe Krafft was recruited to help and it turned out being the wire to the post switch that turns on the dome light at the rear. He said he was thankful that Millard Springer had installed a fuse or the car might have been toast. Sadly though, the good luck didn't hold out. The car's name these years is now "Blaze" due to a tragic fire.

Body stand cart assembly plans of a device as made by Millard Springer were given two pages in the Script. Its intended use was to move bodies around after having been taken off of the frame. Involved were quantities of 10 different items of hardware and lumber and 10 tools. Sources for parts were given as were instructions for cutting to be done by the lumber yard. The editor noted that because the complete instructions ran 7 pages long, rather than publishing them in the Script they would be scanned, placed in the Script-articles Electronic Library, and would be available to anyone needing them.

The month's 1998 Script treated members to a reprint of a 20-Year-old article that had appeared in the Nov.-Dec. Restorer about the 1978 MAFCA International Meet which had been hosted by the GWC. Headed by >>>>>>

John Dingle and Gordon Sanford with the slogan "Golden Days With Golden A's", hosting was a huge undertaking that was in the planning stage for many months. Convention headquarter was the Sheraton National in Arlington. The judging had to be indoors, which presented a challenge. We rented the Thomas Jefferson Community Center at the Junior Highschool. Complications arose with the fire marshal, over insurance, and requirements to cover the vast hardwood flooring where the fine point judging was to take place. Gas tanks had to be drained and cars manually pushed about.

A parade in Washington had been arranged, with traffic on side streets being stopped. There was an unfortunate accident when a driver didn't stop and a Model A was wrecked. People stopped to watch as the parade of Model A's as horns "aoogahed", whistles shrieked and bells rang.

Many of the big names in the Model A community were in attendance, Restorer Editor Phil Allin, Edie Jones, Editor of the Running Board Vogue column, National President Jim Riley, and Paul Moller of carburetor fame to mention a few. A variety of side trips and seminars were scheduled. From our chapter, talks and

demonstrations were made by John Shepherd on shocks, Walt Kandetski about differentials and transmissions, Bill Worsham on Town Sedans, painting by Bill Condon Jr., metal working by Carl Patrick, and steering by Basil Meadows. Two beauty contests were held, a Model A era one plus a modern fashion show with professional models! It seemed nothing had been overlooked. As the Meet drew to a close many Model A'ers were on the road for home. Others stayed in Washington to visit historic sites and enjoy the July 4th events. Memories of Arlington in 1978 would not be forgotten.

Thirty members, and one new member, were present when Milford Sprecher convened the business meeting at 7:35 with the Pledge of Allegiance.

To take advantage of the day light, we heard a quick briefing by John Dougherty on Sully, we are ready but still need volunteers. Contact John if you have already volunteered but have not yet obtained your two free admission passes. Registration opens at 7:00 AM. To prepare for Sully Judging, Gene Rainville explained the judging process for Model A and Non-Model A vehicles. Then, we met in teams of 3 in the parking lot to do a dry run with the scoring sheets. Members brought a total of 8 vehicles to be judged, (4 model As and 4 more modern), thank you all for bringing a great selection. Just as a reminder, a vehicle must have an unexpired Fire Extinguisher to be judged.

After Judging, our officers reported on progress and updates to the planned activities in the May Script. Our June members meeting will not be conducted, instead we ask all to attend the Sully show on June 18 from 10:00 am-3:00 pm.

The July members meeting topic will be about Jim Baker's Model A and how it was equipped for long tours in Europe, Australia, New Zealand, and Alaska.

Milford discussed with members potential joint activities, primarily tours with the Baltimore Club. James Kolody reported on the youth event at Gunston Middle School and thanked the members for attending the downhill gravity race of student-built cars. NEW MEMBER REPORT

My name is David Bolls and I'd like to share a wonderful experience I had with some GWC Model A club members. I attended a Model A club meeting for the first time in May 2023. I inherited a 1929 Model A Tudor from my father, who in turn got it from his father. It's been in the family over 55 years and has had many fun experiences. I first learned how to drive when I was about 16 on it with my Dad in an empty parking lot. I drove it in homecomings and football games. Sadly, it stopped working a few years ago and I had no idea what the issue was. I kept it in my garage not sure what to do about it or if I wanted to sell it.

But once I attended the GWC Model A club, I met very kind folks who immediately offered to help take a look at it. Stan Johnson, John Dougherty, and James Kolody came over to my home to help get it up and running. It was an amazing and exhilarating experience observing them all jump into action as if solving a mathematical problem or Apollo 13 situation where (as Ron Howard's excellent film showed) teamwork gets employed to get the astronauts safely back home. Everyone brought their own unique experiences and I learned a lot interacting with them during the process. Later, John invited me to drive it to his nearby house where we fixed the lights. I never thought it would be fun to work on a machine I thought was too complicated or expensive to fix, but it was neither! Knowing Model As can be fixed by non-specialists really appeals to me and it was a thrill the moment the engine breathed life again. I also have a 5-minute video of Stan and my Dad explaining basic things about the Model A, if that's of interest, too.

GOODNESS GRACIOUS, GREAT BOLLS OF FIRE!

Davis Bolls came to the May club meeting and explained that he was the new owner of a Model A that had been in his family for nearly 70 years. Hi father had given it to him recently and he was eager to get it started after it had spent several decades in storage.

During the course of the meeting, I gave him my phone number in case he needed help or information about the steps to take to get it running again. Over the course of the next several days, I heard from him concerning information relating to installing a battery, coolant, and motor oil.

The last phone call indicated that some on-site advice might be in order, so we made an appointment. I arrived to find Dave and his father and the Model A, waiting patiently in the driveway. It is a nice Model A Tudor sedan, in good condition, having had a restoration in the 1970s. But it had been sitting in a home garage for quite a while. They had installed a new battery and had tried to get it started - to no avail.

So, I began to sort through the clues. The carburetor leaked gas but stopped when the bolt connecting the bottom to the top was tightened. The headlights worked and the horn gave off a muted version of ahooga! So, we had electricity, but when the starter was pressed the engine did not fire at all. Sounds like an ignition problem.

So, the methodical tracing of electricity had to be done. There was electricity present in the posts of the junction box on the firewall. Good. So, is the ignition switch sending current to the distributor? We took the instrument panel loose and discovered that the locking barrel inside the ignition switch was frozen. Turning the key resulted in the whole lock mechanism turning, but <u>not</u> turning on any "juice".

The wire leading to the distributor was pulled out of the dash and into the engine bay. I thought the car could be "hot wired" by attaching the "key end" of that wire to the starter battery post. But just touching the wire to the starter's battery terminal caused a sparking -- oops something is shorted out in the distributor. Disassembly of the distributor did not turn up any obvious shorts, but the wire connecting the lower and upper plate was old and twisted. No amount of unkinking and positioning could resolve the short.

I called John Dougherty to see if he had a backup distributor that we could put in to try to get the car running. John, in turn, called James Kolody and they both soon arrived on the scene with various spare parts. While we waited for them the Bolls and I decided to set the ignition timing so that the replacement distributor could be quickly put in place. With some effort, we got cylinder #1 on top dead center through a combination of the timing pin and taking #1 spark plug out.

When John and James arrived, the rebuilt distributor was put in place and the car started up quickly and before long, was running smoothly. We recommended a new instrument cluster wiring loom and a new distributor be bought from Bratton's, along with a new replacement key and armored cable. The coil had been suspected, but it had proven to be good enough to operate the car for the short warmup period.

The Bolls were very happy. It is always such a pleasure to get a dormant engine running again and feel the sense of accomplishment at having solved the mystery of why the engine would not run. Next time it will be some other reason. Engine Forensics, Model A style.

REED MARTIN AUCTION

I decided to head up to the Reed Martin auction in Frederick, MD on May 13th. There was quite a collection up there, 3 Model A's (Reed's and two others on consignment) the two early three wheelers, over 60 tether cars and dozens of small engines, model airplanes, and other memorabilia. A virtual museum in and of itself.

The crowd was a bit smaller than I expected, but it was a dedicated crowd. There were a few GWC people there. I brought Tom Terko with me. I saw Brad Minners and George Smoleyak there.

REED MARTIN AUCTION (Cont.)

The auction started at 9. The cars were scheduled for 11 AM.

I didn't know what tether cars were until I saw this collection. They were quite popular in the 1930's, powered with small engines and are tethered to a central post. From what I could see, Reed had a great collection and they were in great shape. The prices ranged from \$1-3K per car. Reed also had a number of small boats powered by miniature engines and a bunch of model airplanes and their engines.

One of the special items in his collection was the first model airplane engine ever built. He had documentation for a number of the items in his collection, so he was a collector's collector - someone who knew what he had. A mutual friend told me that the hunt for these items was a big part of the collecting experience for Reed.

The cars went on the block at 11. There was a 1928 Model A Tudor that was consigned to the sale. The max bid was \$4,000 (plus a 12% buyer's premium). The consigner wanted \$8,500, so it did not sell. Next was a 1930 Model A Coupe, consigned by the same person. It sold for \$4,500 and, unfortunately, will probably end up a hot rod.

Reed's 1931 roadster was next. I started it up so attendees could hear it run. It has fiberglass fenders, no shocks and a bad top. It started and ran well. Tom Terko and Jeff Kichline said they could hear a knock in the engine which I did not hear. The bidding went up to \$8K, which I felt was the max it was worth, given the condition. If there is an engine knock, then it was worth even less. I was told that the purchaser was going to put it on Bring A Trailer. Good luck with that.

There was spirited bidding on the 1900 Knox and it sold for \$80,000. There were a couple of bidders on the phone. I had expected it to go higher. The 1899 De Dion Boutin sold for \$136,000. I was told that the Knox and the De Dion were sold to the same person.

After the cars sold, it was back to the smaller collection. Reed had a lot of small model steam and gasoline engines. The little airplane engines sold for \$50-100. Some of the larger steam engines went into the thousands. There was a miniature Model A engine that is one of 25 built. It sold for \$3,200 and a small Model B engine that brought over \$1,000. One of the more unique items was a gasoline powered pogo stick. I had never seen one before.

I brought some cash and was interested in a steam engine, but most were too rich for my blood. I was distracted for a few minutes and missed out on one that I might have been able to buy.

It was a great collection and a fun sale. We left before most of the airplanes and odds and ends were sold. Five hours at an auction is enough for me. Having known Reed a bit, it was sad to see his collection sold, but he had a varied and fruitful life, which is all you can ask for.

Light Switch Actuating Tool

Tiny Tips From MAFCA Members

WHEN WORKING ON A MODEL A'S WIRING, it's sometimes necessary to remove and/or repair the light switch on the end of the steering column. After completing the repairs and before reinstalling the light switch, it's advisable to test the system. This can be easily done by making a special tool. The required parts:

- light switch spider, part number B-3643
- 4- or 5-inch long ¼-20 carriage bolt with full length threads
- 2 each ¼ inch lock washers
- 2 each ¼ inch nuts
- ¹/₄-20 wing nut

Slide the spider on the bolt, place a lock washer and nut, and tighten the nut to the spider.

Place a nut, washer, and the wing nut on the opposite end and tighten them so the wing nut is parallel with the spider. The tool is now ready for use.

INSERT THE SPIDER END into the light switch and engage the rotating portion of the switch. Now the switch may be actuated by rotating the wing nut.

• With the wing nut rotated fully clockwise the switch is in the parking light position.

- One click counterclockwise is the off position.
- One more click counterclockwise is low beam.
- The last position is high beam.

AFTER CONFIRMING THE SWITCH is wired correctly, return it to the off position. In this position, the wing nut (and spider) should be vertical (in the 6 o'clock/12 o'clock position) and in line with the

alignment boss on the light switch housing on the bottom of the unit.

Place the light handle at the steering wheel in the 6 o'clock position, replace the light switch on the lower end of the steering column, and secure with the bail.

WITH THIS TOOL, the switch can be tested and the position can be preset to the off position for easy alignment with the horn and light switch actuating rod prior to assembly. Θ
