George Washington Chapter Model A Ford Club of America Board Meeting June 28, 2023

President Milford Sprecher called the GWC board meeting of the club's 60th anniversary year to order at 7:03 PM. Board members in attendance: Milford Sprecher, Hank Zajic, Doug Tomb, Gene Rainville, Bill Bass, John Dougherty, James Kolody, Jeff VanGorder, and Dave Greenwood. A quorum of the board membership was maintained through the meeting.

The Board expressed appreciation to the Sully Chair John Dougherty and the committee for another fantastic car show.

SULLY #48 BOD Report.

All indicators point to a very successful show. Weather was good, crowd estimate about 4800 like last year, 342 cars and trucks (one less than last year). No major incidents: four minor heat injuries, two cantankerous cars (that I know of). Revenue was good, net is \$8,777, plus final check from food vendor in August (less cost for ice and food vouchers for Police and EMTs). Doug has details for each expense and income line for Sully. Flea Market and Car Corral were down like last year but did OK for income in view of zero cost.

FROM THE SMOKE-FREE ROOM (Cont.)

I canvassed the co-chairs for feedback:

Positives: Volunteers – about 70 and the Zadnik Grandchildren were great! Judging process and trophies on time. New registration procedure, Take Apart 'T', Antique Engines, and "overall, a great show". Negatives: Traffic delays getting into the park! Issue with one food vendor who failed to properly coordinate with us and just showed up. She managed to get the attention of the Fire Inspector – and left after an unsuccessful set-up.

Room to Improve:

- 1. Number of Flea Market Vendors.
- 2. Informing car owners to be parked NLT10AM.
- 3. New volunteer training. Need know what to expect to hit the ground running.
- 4. Registration delays. Line and forms for day of registration slow the process.
- 5. The new registration procedure caused some confusion at the Car Corral.

6. Field Layout on Friday always seems to get off to a slow start. Working on: pictures, GPS pins, improved map.

7. Informing owners how a 'to be judged' vehicle should be prepared.

Chairman dropped the ball on Dash Plaques from previous years. Who has them?

John thanked all the committee and volunteers for supporting the show. He also reported out that the Bill Worsham memorial bench will be installed at Sully for dedication at the GWC picnic on July 15.

Treasurer – We are in a much-anticipated positive position with Sully income and expenses mostly accounted for. Doug's summary report will be in the Script, of note he said we sold 1516 snow cones (twice the amount as last year) and thanked those who worked the stand.

Activities- Gene is now focused on final preparation and registrations for the July 15 picnic and Jeff will get a reminder e-mail out to the members. The focus will then shift to final preparations for the 60th anniversary celebration at Mount Vernon on August 19.

Programs- Hank highlighted the July event with Jim Baker's presentation on his Touring A that has been to Australia, New Zealand, Europe, Alaska, and Colorado. Jim's car will be at the meeting, so members can see the modifications he made to sustain the road trips. In August, Dave Gunnarson from the V8 Club will present. September will be a summary slides from all the various Model Events: Sully, National meets etc. Doug will contact the American Legion Hall about our meeting plans.

Carl Patrick Awards - The award will be presented at the December Christmas party; James is sending Hank a Picture of the last awarded Plaque, so Hank can get one prepared.

MARC mileage awards update- Hank has ordered 7 brass plaques and will be contacting the other 7 awardees to determine the car status and interest before ordering the other 7 and will coordinate with Jim Cartmill on the awards.

Upcoming Tours- August 12, the GWC board approved co-sponsoring the DC area tour with the Model T club. Milford sent an e-mail to Jeff for distribution to the members. Milford is working on the details of a River Road tour for September 23 +/-. A tour to St. Michaels, MD is shaping up for October 26-28 and may include the Baltimore Club, the gathering spot is at the McDonald's on West Street in Annapolis. He is anticipating about 10 cars on the tour and will be obtaining a block of rooms.

The meeting was adjourned at 8:17.



At the board meeting held at Editor Bill's Tacoma Park, Md. Home, Clem Clement, George Smolenyak Jr., Stan Johnson, Bill Worsham, Al Meeks, Don Temple and Millard Springer were in attendance. It included a complete list of required parts, suggestions regarding where best to acquire them, top and side views showing dimensions and location of all necessary holes, plus pictures of it under construction.

The Virginia Country Tour had begun at Hamilton, Va. on June 7th and was attended by 13 Model A's plus a '38 Ford pickup. Starting with an outstanding brunch at the "Beautiful South" restaurant, 11 Model A's proceeded afterwards through the beautiful Virginia countryside on all two-lane hard surfaced roads through Loudoun and Fauquier Counties. The trip covered 125 miles, with stops for gas and ice cream, not to mention a stop at a winery to "tipple". Plans were made to do it again in the fall.

A good selection of Model A's were offered on the swap page; a couple of '29's, a '31 and a '30, less the cowl section!

STARTER BENDIX BOLT KEEPERS

In addition to getting my car ready for Sully, I went over to help Bill Sims with the starter on his car. He had a starter problem on Gene Rainville's tour and swapped out a starter with a spare one of Gene's, which he had to return.

We removed Gene's starter and put the bolts back in the Bendix on Bill's starter. We were able to fish the lost bolt and keeper out of the bell housing, thankfully.

The keeper is a washer with two tabs, one that goes into a gap on the starter spring and the other which bends up to hold the bolt in place. The new ones that I had have a hole that is larger than the bolt. You can bend the tab over, but it is not as snug as it could be and I didn't want Bill to have the same thing happen again, so I went back to my garage and got a spare starter I probably got from Stan Johnson and removed one of those keepers to use on Bill's car. I also used blue Loctite as an extra bit of insurance. Bill's car started right up after we put the starter back in and Bill made it to Sully in his car, even if I didn't make it with my car.

There are two sizes of the starter Bendix bolts - 5/16 and 3/8. We need to make sure that we are using the right size washers for the starters on our cars otherwise the bolts may not stay in place. A simple thing, but it can make a big difference on the road.

FORD TRIMOTOR

The Ford TriMotor airplane showing at the Frederick, MD airport looked interesting, so Loretta and I decided to go. It was going to be a little hot for us in the Coupe, so we went modern with AC. Not so the Baltimore Club! They lined up around the plane for a great photo. The representatives had quite a story about the 1929 plane. It had been owned by Bill Harrah of casino and car museum fame and had been dismantled and reskinned with smooth sheet metal for less drag at some point. Since then, it received the original style corrugated skin and replacement engines. One item for Clem, the engine nacelle sheet metal was fastened with Phillips head screws, so I asked about that since they were invented in 1936 or so. The fellow said that they were FAA-certified and proper ones would have been quite a chore. The Baltimore Club attendees were Steve Myers, with grandsons Jack and Luke Anderson, Don and Linda Keller, Jim Wolbert, Dave Sturges, and Hunter Fanney. We all had a nice lunch at the airport restaurant and then a few stayed to take a ride in the Trimotor.

The pilots reading this probably are familiar with this, but the tail wheel was just a caster and it was steered on the ground with the throttles and what looked like disk brakes on the wheels. The replacement engines were not the original type and had electric starters. The fellow told me (I think) that the original engines had a windup

spring starter! It must have been a hefty one to spin those nine-cylinder engines! The interior looked very nice, but it must have been noisy. I was looking at the suspension pivots, which drew my attention to the shock (or is it just a spring? Pretty early for hydraulic shock absorbers). Its load goes into the bottom of the engine nacelle, so the weight of the plane is supported by the wing. Most planes seem to have the landing gear attached to the fuselage, but in flight the wings hold the plane up, so it was merely different.

Do yourself a favor and come!!! Assemble at 9:00 AM. Trailer parking available for the day. **Bring \$12.00 per person in cash (the entry fee to Hillwood), your picnic lunch, and expectations to be richly rewarded**. Model Ts should have a full tank of gas for the 42-mile tour ending with a long "4-gallon hill" from Chain Bridge to Glebe Road. Modern cars acceptable.

Hillwood, built in the 1920s, is the former residence of businesswoman, socialite, philanthropist and collector <u>Marjorie Merriweather Post</u> who combined her status as the heir to several industrial fortunes and wife of the 1930's ambassador from the US to the Soviet Union to acquire an astonishing collection of decorative arts as the Soviets auctioned off the wealth of the Romanov Tsars. The museum also features stunning gardens and botanical delights on the 13-acre property that includes a vista down to the Washington Monument.

For our annual picnic, we will drive to **Glen Echo Park**, founded in 1891 as a National Chautauqua Assembly. By 1911, it transformed into DC's premier amusement park until it closed in 1968, but now includes the fully restored, 100-year-old Dentzel Carousel. While at Glen Echo, you may visit the **Clara Barton National Historic Site**, the last home of the teacher, nurse, and humanitarian who was the founder of the American Red Cross.

Glenstone Museum combines the largest private contemporary art collection in the United States, world-class architecture, and a stunningly curated natural landscape – the 21st century counterpoint to Hillwood on a 130-acre footprint created by Danaher Corporation's Mitchell and Emily Rales. We will only have time for a snippet – but our visit is timed to hear the once-a-week playing of the **steam calliope** – the musical aspect of the installation, *The Katastwóf Karavan*, by world-renowned artist, Kara Walker.

Thanks to Dick Sullivan for helping to lay out this tour. Although it is more urban than many of our tours, our Model Ts will never be on a major city avenue and will never have a left tour with significant, non-stop cross traffic.
