



Leaf Clusters. Mike enjoyed his service in the Army so much that he recruited his first wife, Ruth, and their daughters Sandi and Mindy to also join the Army.

Mike lived a long happy life and most of all loved his family. He was an eternal optimist and despite health obstacles, he took every opportunity to spend time doing the things he loved. He looked forward to his plans for the next day. His contagious smile and playful sense of humor will provide many fond memories for all who knew him. He will be dearly missed.

After retirement, Mike shared his passion for genealogy with his wife Janell. Together they discovered his grandmother's Finnish roots and traveled to Finland to meet what became a much-loved extended family. # FORD MOTOR COMPANY PRESENCE IN WASHINGTON, DC

A Ford Motor Company assembly plant on Pennsylvania Ave in Washington, DC? Apparently, that was Ford's thinking when the company acquired land and constructed a facility within sight of the U.S. Capitol in 1916, according to amateur Ford historian Dave Gunnarson in a presentation given to the Club at the August meeting. Dave, who previously gave a program on Ford's Richmond Hill, GA, estate was back with an interesting talk about the Ford Motor Company presence in Washington, DC.

Ford's success with the Model T and efforts to reduce production costs led to the construction of assembly plants around the United States. Washington, DC, was one of the sites chosen and a building similar to other assembly plants around the United States was constructed on the site. According to Dave, there are no records of any cars assembled there, but there were offices and a vehicle service facility and showroom. The building was sold to the DC Government in 1931 and remained until it was demolished in 1979. The Canadian Embassy occupies the site today.

The Ford building was the site of a disturbance during the Bonus March in 1932, when thousands of out-of-work veterans of World War I marched on Washington to demand payment for their service. Two veterans were killed when a riot broke out near the Ford building.

Ford also had a branch office at 1018 15th St., NW. Very little is known about what that building was for and when Ford sold it. The building still exists, but with few indications that it was a Ford location.

The final Ford location was the one on the waterfront in Alexandria. Designed by Albert Kahn and built on wood pilings over the Potomac River in 1932, it served as a wholesale distribution and service facility for automobiles until 1942, when the U.S. Navy put it into temporary service as a munitions factory. That building remained on the Alexandria waterfront until it was demolished in 1996. The building was constructed on untreated wooden pilings driven into the bottom of the Potomac River. The pilings were rotting and there was no way to save the building, unfortunately.

It seems that Ford had a need for a facility in Washington and constructed the building in Alexandria after it sold the building on Pennsylvania Ave. The Alexandria facility had water access, but the building on Pennsylvania Ave was not located on a railroad line, which would be necessary for delivering parts and receiving assembled cars, so it seems unlikely to me that it was a practical location for an assembly plant.

Thanks to Dave for another excellent presentation on Ford history in Washington, DC.

The series is intended to provide Club members insight to different areas in the Greater Capital Region that you probably drive by all the time but don't really know what happens there.

Hank provided a combo of slides, photographs and video clips that illustrated the Naval Architecture work that occurs at this significant Navy Research and Development Center. Most important though, he provided insight into four major programs that offer internship and job opportunities to high schoolers and college students at Navy facilities across the country. This included the Science and Engineering Apprenticeship Program (SEAP) for highschoolers, Naval Research Enterprise Internship Program (NREIP) for college students, Pathways Program for both high school and college students that provides internships with the possibility of a permanent federal job offer, and the Science, Mathematics and Research for Transformation (SMART) program.

A flyer was sent around to the Club membership prior to the meeting with program details so if you are interested and missed the meeting, look back in your email for a note from Membership Chair Jeff. For most of these programs, timing is critical. Most applications are due by the end of October. To see a video with some highlights of what you missed in the program, enter "The Navy's Indoor Ocean" in your computer browser and select the 20-minute Veritasium program.

# SALUTE FOR LIEUTENANT COLONEL PAUL GAUTHIER, USAF (RETIRED)



In the bright sunshine on 18 September, Paul's family, joined by neighbors and friends, gathered at Arlington National Cemetery for Paul's funeral.

The procession met the United States Air Force Honor Guard at the Columbarium. The Honor Guard included the Color Guard, band, a platoon of Airmen, and pallbearers. After processing with the Honor Guard from the Columbarium to the graveside the Firing Party, Bugler, Chaplain and a

representative from the Ladies of Arlington were at the ready.

The ceremony was flawless, as is the norm at Arlington. It included Pallbearers carrying Paul's flag draped coffin from the hearse to the gravesite accompanied by ceremonial music. The Chaplain provided a eulogy and was followed by the Firing Party Salute (three rifle volleys by seven Airmen), the playing of Taps,\* and flag folding by the pallbearers. After receiving the flag from a pallbearer, the Chaplain presented Paul's flag to his bride Laurel. Then Laurel was greeted by a Lady of Arlington.

At the conclusion of the ceremony, Paul's family was greeted by those in attendance. Paul's funeral with honors on a beautiful late summer day was befitting a man who lived his life for God, family and country.

Paul was born 13 June 1940 in Green Bay, Wisconsin, and took his final flight on Easter Sunday, 9 April 2023 from Fairfax, Virginia. Paul's grave is near the top of a knoll in Section 57 at Arlington National Cemetery. His gravesite, number 1641, overlooks the United States Air Force Memorial in Arlington.



### GWC C&O CANAL TOUR #3 RESCHEDULED TO NOVEMBER 11

We should finish up back at Glen Echo at 3:00 at the latest, barring mishap. Those from Virginia may opt to take the Rte. 15 Point of Rocks bridge to go home either after lunch or after ice cream.

#### DECEMBER PROGRAM: BROWN BAG GIFT EXCHANGE, SOME GUIDELINES

I am writing this article on the first of October. Everyone knows that preparing for the holidays comes earlier and earlier—playing Christmas Carols ... so the good idea is for me to talk a little about our December Program, the Christmas Brown Bag Gift exchange. In fact, the Club's Board of Directors discussed at the September Board meeting a need to provide guidelines for the December gift exchange program to help ensure everyone has a good time at this event, so here we go ....

Each person will bring a nice gift, "wrapped" in a brown bag – and this bag will be your admission to the event. Lady-specific gifts should be marked on the outside with a large "L". The bags are placed on a table in front of the room. Each member gets a ticket stub in exchange for his bag. The other half of the ticket goes into a bowl.

"Nice Gift" means "No Junk!" - Find something among your Model A holdings that you would like to get as a gift if you didn't already have it. If you can't find something, a new part or tool in the \$20+ range would be just right.

Then comes the fun! When the meeting begins, a ticket is drawn from the bowl. The holder of that ticket comes to the front and selects a bag from the table, turns around and opens the bag so that everyone can see the gift. When the *oohs* and *ahhs* have subsided, he/she draws a ticket from the bowl, hands it to the Master of Ceremonies, and returns to his/her seat with the gift. The new number is called out and the holder of that ticket comes forward and announces his/her decision:

- 1) Take a gift that has previously been unwrapped, or
- 2) Select and open a new bag.

If he/she takes a previously opened gift, then that person (who relinquishes the gift) comes back to the front to 1) take a bag or 2) a previous gift, but not the one just relinquished.

Each subsequent ticket holder comes forward and has the chance to take any previously opened gift or take an unopened bag from the table except that the third holder of a given item gets to keep that item. (Example: Tom opens up a carburetor, Karen takes the carburetor from Tom, Benny takes the carburetor from Karen and gets to keep it).

The fun is always increased when someone opens a gift that multiple people are eager to own. So wrap a gift up in a brown bag and come to the meeting ready for a good time. In the end you will go home with a nice gift and pleasant memories.

In the November Script, I will provide a detailed schematic of how our game is played.
