

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

THINGS TO WATCH WHEN INSTALLING NEW RADIAL TIRES AND TUBES

I wanted to point out an issue with installing new American Classic radials tires and their tubes. The tubes are Hartford brand and both purchased from Coker Tire. I installed the tubes and the tires and found myself with a flat tire after only a few hundred miles. I removed the tube and found that there was a hole in the tube. I looked at the area inside the tire and found that there were a number of stickers inside of the tire at the same place as the hole. It was pretty clear to me that the hole was associated with the stickers on the tube. If you look closely at the photos, you should be able to see the square impressions on the tubes. These are associated with the inspection stickers inside the tire. They are quite stubborn to remove and sometimes hard to find.

I later dismounted all my tires to make sure that there were no other stickers inside the tires that could cause a hole in the tube. Every tire had these stickers. I found one tube where the holes had started to form, but had not gone all the way through the tube. A box with a replacement tube had a warning on the outside about making sure that nothing is inside the tire, including inspection stickers inside the tires. I have mounted many tires with tubes and had never found that those stickers were a problem, but in this case they are. Maybe the composition of the stickers has changed, so be sure to remove any stickers you find inside the tire so that you don't end up with a flat down the road.

I posted about my experience on Ford Barn and the Vintage Ford Forum and have heard of others who had the same experience I had. I have also talked to other Model A owners who had similar problems. It is not a universal experience, but when it comes to flat tires, an ounce of prevention is in order. The associated photos show the stickers inside the tires and the holes I got in my tubes.

REPORT FROM THE ARMED FORCES RETIREMENT HOME SHOW

I attended the Armed Forces Retirement Home Car Show last month representing the GWC, held at the Armed Forces Retirement Home in NW DC. It turned out to be a beautiful day.

ST. MICHAELS TOUR A SUNNY SUCCESS

After talking about organizing a tour to St. Michaels for a few years, I finally delivered and the weather couldn't have been better.

The group met at McDonald's on West St. in Annapolis, where we met for the Kent Island tours. GWC members present were Bruce and Loretta Metcalf, Jim and Connie Baker, Gene Rainville and John Leydon. Members of the Greater Baltimore Model A Club attending were Steve Meyer, Dave and Lori McLeish and Don Keller. We were joined at the last minute by Steve Van Pelt, a former GWC member who just rejoined. He is also a member of the Baltimore club. John Leydon didn't bring a car but rode with different participants during the tour.

We took back roads around Annapolis and to the Bay Bridge. We crossed the Bay Bridge and exited at Rte. 8 through Stevensville, crossing the old draw bridge at Kent Narrows, and through Grasonville. The draw bridge was up when we arrived, so we got a sense of what it was like in the old days when that was Rte. 50 and traffic would back up when the bridge opened.

At Queenstown we merged onto Rte. 50 again and exited at Wye Mills, where we stopped at the Old



Wye Mill and got a wonderful tour of that facility. A mill has operated on that site since 1682. The docent told us how there were many mills on the Eastern Shore, but once the Bay Bridge opened in 1952, it was more economical to ship the grain across the bay for milling.

The owner of Wye Mill sold it to the state in 1952 so a pond could be built across the road. The mill is run by a nonprofit that continues to grind some grain there for sale to the public. We also were shown a more recent roller mill, which the mill moved to because it was more productive and economical to operate.

We left Wye Mill and drove a few miles along the old road and got back on Rte. 50. We exited 50 onto the old road after a few miles, traveling through Longwoods and turning to drive through Miles River Neck. We drove down Bruff's Island Road and passed Wye Plantation, which has been in the same family since 1650. it is also the plantation where Frederick Douglass spent a few years as a boy.

We continued down Bruff's Island Road where we turned around, doubling back onto Copperville Road. Copperville is a small African-American community that was established on part of the Lloyd plantation after the Civil War.

Our next stop was Tunis Mills on Leeds Creek. There was a lumber mill located there in the 19th century and boats went to Baltimore from there. Once we left Tunis Mills, we continued across the Miles River Bridge to Rte. 33, the road to St. Michaels.

We had lunch reservations for the Crab Claw on St. Michaels Harbor for 1 PM, but we were running about a half an hour late. We had a pretty filling meal at the Crab Claw. Afterwards, some of us went to the Maritime Museum next door to the restaurant and some went back to the hotel. For dinner, some opted for pizza and a small group went down to the Chesapeake Landing restaurant for a light dinner.

For Friday's activities we met after breakfast at the hotel. Steve Meyers' wife joined us at the hotel for the day. We first drove to Claiborne Landing, where the ferry boat from Kent Island used to arrive bringing cars bound for Ocean City. The ferry stopped in 1952, but the ferry slip is still there and looks like a boat could dock at any time.

From Claiborne, we drove to Bellevue where we picked up the ferry to Oxford. We got all the vehicles on the ferry and it was a nice sight seeing all the Model A's on the ferry for the short trip across the Tred Avon River.

At Oxford, we had lunch reservations for noon and we had time to explore the town a bit. It was one of two ports of entry into Maryland in the 1600's, so it was a



prosperous town in its early days. George Washington's Aide-de-Camp Tench Tilghman was from Oxford and is buried there. Robert Morris, the financier of the Revolution spent time there, as well. We had lunch at the Robert Morris Inn, named after him. The Inn claims that it is the oldest continuously operating full-service inn in America. We had a good lunch, but the restaurant refused to separate out our checks, so we had to figure out who had what and divvy the bill up. After lunch we headed to Highland Creamery for the obligatory ice cream stop.

After ice cream we headed back on the ferry to return to St. Michaels. The captain of the ferry had changed and he was not comfortable putting Bruce and Loretta's car on the ferry, so they had to wait until the ferry returned to make the trip across

We headed back to St. Michaels, where we had a tour of the St. Michaels Museum and I provided a short walking tour of the harbor area to those who were interested. We ended up on the main street, where some of the group visited some of the shops in town. For dinner, we came back to the harbor area and had dinner at Foxy's on the harbor.



Saturday was the return home. It was mostly a reverse of the trip down. Getting onto and across Rte. 50 was a bit challenging and it kept us on our toes. We made a trip to Wye Island on the way back, stopping for a short walk into an old growth forest with large trees that were up to 250 years old. It is deer season for muzzle loaders and we heard more than a few shots off in the distance. We made the trip out and back unscathed, however.

The trip back to Annapolis was uneventful, save getting across a very busy Rte. 50. I took a wrong turn in Annapolis, but it was a minor detour. At Annapolis we stopped for lunch and went our separate ways. A very successful outing.

The Baltimore club brought their walkie talkies, which were very useful. Our Club has two walkie talkies that Clem had, but the Baltimore club has four, which allows better communication.

This was the first overnight tour I had organized. I think it turned out pretty well. It was nice to have the Baltimore club along to fill out our numbers and especially nice to have outstanding weather!

WARNING ON LONG LIFE ANTIFREEZE

(Article forwarded by Phil Roche, written by Dave Tulawitzky, first published in Jim Cranes Western Michigan Buick Chapter newsletter.)

Antifreeze manufacturers have reformulated their products for long life and the inhibitor attacks, among other things, silicone compounds—the most commonly used base for gasket sealants. It also attacks lead-based products (solder and Babbit), some yellow metals (cam bearings, radiators), and conventional gaskets and packing materials.

The warning here is to NOT use coolants with OAT inhibitors in your antique car. You need to read the product label and use only IAT (Inorganic Additive Technology) inhibited antifreeze.

OAT stands for "Organic Acid Technology" based corrosion inhibitors and they are designed to have longer service life than that of IAT coolants. Unfortunately, that feature comes with a bad side effect for older cars. One fellow decided to change antifreeze in his antique car. His regular brand was out of stock so he bought the "advanced" formula. Four weeks later he found pools of antifreeze under his car. The antifreeze had dissolved the old gaskets. It was formulated with OAT inhibitors.

Here are some tips for finding IAT coolants:

- 1. Prestone says that all of its current antifreezes are OAT formulas.
- 2. Peak says that their antifreeze and coolant is an IAT formula. The container is blue. It is important that it not say "long life." Peak Sierra brand is propylene glycol for those who prefer that. It, too, uses an IAT formula.
- 3. Żerex says that Zerex Original Green is an IAT formula. It comes in a white container. Do not use their G-05 formula in the gold jug.

Club comments:

I'm using Prime and Advanced Auto Parts antifreeze coolants. They say "Extended life." Neither say OAT/IAT. They are both green. Clem

Try "Conventional GREEN Formula" "PEAK" Antifreeze & Coolant. It's good for "All Makes and Models: 1989 and earlier"----says so on the gallon container!!!! I use it in my "A" and '59 Cad. I have articles written on it somewhere around here if you want me to find them and send to you. The newer stuff is not good for old cars! Rick Menz

It is true. Don't even use any modern antifreeze that says long lasting, or heavy duty. They are acid based and will erode the head gaskets and lead solder on the radiators. They are all made for the new aluminum core radiators. CARQUEST makes a house brand antifreeze for older vehicles (read ones with copper core/lead solder radiators). Doug Cox






