Board Meeting Minutes January 25, 2024



Milford Sprecher President opened the meeting at 7:00 PM. This was a transition meeting with the prior and current Board to maintain continuity and answer questions. Board members in attendance: (Hank Zajic and Gene Rainville 2023 BOD members), John Dougherty, James Kolody, Jeff VanGorder, Bruce Metcalf, Bill Bass, Bill Sims, Don White, Valerie Faircloth, and Dave Greenwood. Doug Tomb participated via conference call.

The Board thanked Gene and Hank for their tireless service coordinating the 60th anniversary year. Milford appointed Don White to be Vice President per the bylaws section Article IX, section I, and the BOD unanimously approved the permanent 2024 appointment.

Treasurer: Doug presented and reviewed a draft balanced budget for 2024, having circulated it prior to the meeting. After discussions, a motion was made by John, seconded by Dave and unanimous approval was given to the budget as presented.

Sully Car Show #49 & 50: John received an email and the attachment from the Fairfax County Park Authority, the LOA signed by all parties. John will be contacting committee members and holding a meeting on or about February 6 to move it forward. The discussion will include 49th and 50th plans. The County has new equipment to paint the lines and fields for the show and that will be discussed. The BOD also discussed increased participation in the flea market and allocation of spaces.

Programs: Don presented the outline for the first couple of meetings. February's program will be led by Doug and the topic will focus on vehicles prior to the 1928 Model A. Future program topics include the X-8 engine development, scale-model cars, and cross-country tours.

Membership: Jeff has not yet received dues renewal from 38 members, a final notice will go out with the February Script and individual calls will be made. He has begun work on updating and printing the 2024 roster. There was a discussion about including pictures of members with their cars. The thought is that we could have a monthly Script article on a member and their car to begin this process. No action was taken at this time.

Activities: Milford has obtained 4 new walkie talkies for coordination on tours. Doug, with Gene's assistance, is developing a 2-day tour to Orange, VA, near Montpelier, Lake Anna and Monticello, and a car show at a senior-living community. There was also a discussion of joint activities with other clubs.

Script: Bill Sims will be preparing a resource list for the Script of vendors, suppliers and mechanics recommended by members. January articles are due on February 5.

Youth: James is looking for additional youth activities, John suggested we contact a school media-arts program about doing a video or photo documentation of the Sully show.

Other: We need a coordinator for the MARC mileage program and a lead for refreshments for the general meetings—we may rotate the refreshment assignment. The meeting was adjourned at 8:00 PM.

THE GEORGE WASHINGTON CHAPTER 25 YEARS AGO (1999)

A tally showed that 103 of our members were now on the web, a significant percentage. President Clem Clement joined in the fray, referring to his column this month as "The President's Computer." Membership Chairman Jon Phillips made a motion to reserve a URL address for future development of the Club web page because they were being taken quickly as use of the internet expanded. The motion was unanimously approved by the board.



President Clem invited all to his annual Train Day and said it was a chance for Club members and their families and friends to get together and talk in mid-winter and to catch up on what had been going on since the Christmas season, adding that the train room seemed to be a catalyst for conversation and a facilitator of friendliness.

"Call The Professionals" was the heading for an article in the Ford Script by Judy Springer who said that it might not be known that there were those among the membership who made their living doing restoration or related Model A work. She mentioned Bill Beardmore, who was a retired fireman, who started a second career running a full-time body shop. Walt Bratton was already well known as a leading supplier of quality Model A parts, and for years members benefitted from the annual Parts Day event he so generously hosted. Don Jenkins was the proprietor of an upholstery shop in Frederick, Md., well known for guality work on antique and modern cars. Millard Springer ran Springer Industries, doing limited restoration and mechanical repair work, and principally producing Model A parts and part rebuilding for Walt's business. Donnie Temple's business (at the time when he was still in Great Falls) was Seneca Hill Auto Repair, after closing his paint store, which cleverly had been called Paintin' Place. Judy pointed out that these people have regular work hours, shops, and overhead. They had to acquire expensive tools and have extensive knowledge in their specialized fields, therefore shouldn't be expected to work for free for you just because you belong to the Club. The good news was they were people known to the Club and have been active in supporting our chapter over the years.

John Kandl hosted a wheel-straightening event at his country home around Bealton, Va. All in all, 20 wheels were straightened and everyone had a good time in the process. Jon Phillips and Donnie Temple got a load of them ready for an upcoming powder coating. Clem said he brought along three of his wheels but it turned out they were pretty good, so they bent them up to match his phaeton.

As we all know, the Sully Car Show is the primo annual event for the GWC. Each year, the signing the letter of agreement (LOA) with the Fairfax County Park Authority kicks off the march to the show on Fathers' Day, which this year will be Sunday, June 16. So, Wednesday, January 24, at the Sully Historic Site, Sully Chairman John Dougherty, in person, inked his signature along with Paola Schiapacasse, Historic Sites and Horticulture Branch Manager, on the letter of agreement (LOA) with the Fairfax County Park Authority. LEAP DAY— FEBRUARY 29TH

A leap year is a calendar year that contains an additional day (or, in the case of a lunisolar calendar, a month) added to keep the calendar year synchronized with the astronomical year or seasonal year. Because astronomical events and seasons do not repeat in a whole number of days, calendars that have a constant number of days in each year will unavoidably drift over time with respect to the event that the year is supposed to track, such as seasons. By inserting (called intercalating in technical terminology) an additional day or month into some years, the drift between a civilization's dating system and the physical properties of the Solar System can be corrected. A year that is not a leap year is a common year. — Wikipedia

The Gregorian Calendar Fixed Caesar's Math

For all its improvements, the Julian calendar still miscalculated the length of a solar year by <u>11</u> <u>minutes</u>. That may not seem like much, but the discrepancy added up over time, and by 1582 CE, the months of the calendar and the seasons were misaligned. This concerned Pope Gregory XIII, who noticed that Easter was becoming increasingly out of sync with the spring equinox — <u>a problem</u> for the Catholic Church. In response, the pope launched the Gregorian calendar on <u>October 4, 1582</u>, which set the following day as October 15, jumping the calendar ahead 10 days. <u>Chaos ensued</u>: Catholic countries adopted the reformed calendar, but many Protestant nations waited more than a century to get on board. The British Empire, including its colonies in America, waited until 1752 to switch to the Gregorian calendar, and Russia didn't adopt the new calendar until as late as <u>1918, after the Russian Revolution</u>.—History Facts

DATA PLATE SUCCESS

You have spent a lot of time and money restoring your A and just completed the finishing touches. Time to install the Ford patent data plate on the firewall. Great—the plate you ordered has drive rivets, an easy job. Oh no, the drive rivets are too small—the firewall holes are 1/8 inch! Too late to weld them shut and redrill, the firewall is already painted. Now what? Glue the rivets, use pop rivets, use a screw?

Now you know my emotions when I encountered this issue. The easy solution is to order larger drive rivets whose shank is 1/8 inch but whose head is the same as the package rivets. Like most things on my projects—expensive. I had to special-order them but in bulk (100). It worked, perfect fit and looks great. Yes, for the experts out there, I know the firewall is to be an unpolished finish and mine is shiny. I have a clear coat on all the paint so on a rainy day I will buff it satin to dull it down. Well, that is when all the other to-dos are finished. Let me know if you need my 1/8 inch drive rivets to install your new data plate, I have 96 to share.

Based on these mileages we have no awards pending for 2023. Not that some folks weren't driving; Chuck Kunstbeck managed to rack up 1,770 miles and Milford Sprecher, our illustrious President, drove 1,142 miles. Several members are close to the next level award, so hopefully 2024 will be a good award year for GWC.

The Mileage Program is sponsored and administered by MARC and one of the requirements of the program is membership in that organization. All mileage accumulated throughout the year counts toward the program. However, mileage accumulated during years you are not a member of MARC does not count toward an award. Betty Fisher is the National MARC Mileage Program Chairperson. Betty uses the MARC roster to determine membership. If a Club member drops their membership in MARC, I do not carry them in the program, though I do maintain their previous data. Should they rejoin, their mileage begins accumulating from their total the last year they were a member. If you purchase a car from a person in the program, you have the option of continuing the existing miles or you may start over from zero.

If you are planning to go to any national meets, participate in Club events, or just drive your Model "A", why not make your miles count by joining the MARC Mileage Program? To join, you must, as mentioned, be a member of MARC and pay a one-time registration fee of \$1.00 per car. Your car must be of original manufacture (1927-1931), be titled as a Model "A", and be authentic in that it should have an original type four-cylinder engine (1927-1934, Burtz engines are acceptable) and have an original body style for the year of manufacture. Awards begin at the 2,000-mile point, followed by a 5,000-mile award, then every 5,000 miles thereafter. Come join the fun and make all those 2024 miles count. You can find more information and a registration form on the MARC Web Site and mail it directly to Betty. You can also contact me by phone at home (540-743-5510), by cell (540-878-8819), or by email (cartmil@embargmail.com), to talk more about the program. When you send your registration form to Betty, please let me know so I can enter you in the Club Mileage Program spreadsheet.

MAFFI MINUTE

The Gilmore Auto Museum, the site of the Model A Museum, is open year-round and at this time of year the museum has Sunday afternoon lectures at 2 p.m. The website has a complete listing, but one that I found enticing is on February 4, "How to Buy and Sell Collector Cars."

However, if a trip to Hickory Corners, Michigan, isn't in your January/February travel plans, you can still indulge in Model A hobby fun by visiting or re-visiting the maffi.org website. The website has 4 live streaming cameras to view the museum from your armchair. And, if you click the Media button, you can hear the audio recordings of original records developed in the Model A era for salesmen's use in training and customer sales. They're fun to listen to!

If you're more of a visual person, there's a MAFFI YouTube site, also accessible from the website as well as Paul Shinn, the Model A Guy's YouTube site, accessible from the website.

And let's not forget the upcoming Valentine's Day. You do have a Model A that is your sweetheart, don't you? Why not honor her (or him) with her/his picture at the Model A museum next to your name by getting involved in the "My A" program. It features a plaque mounted on a museum wall segregated by year (1928, 1929, 1930, 1931) showing your vehicle, your name, your home area, and your vehicle body style. Details can be found under "expansion" on the maffi.org website.

And, as a bit of fun trivia, let me leave you with this tidbit. One hundred and ten years ago, on Jan. 5, 1914, Henry Ford implemented a \$5 per day wage for his workers. But workers soon found out they wouldn't immediately get the \$5 per day. Workers still made \$2.30 and were given a \$2.70 bonus if they followed all of the company's requirements. Here's how workers would be eligible:

- abstain from alcohol
- not physically abusive toward their families
- not take in boarders
- keep homes clean
- contribute to a savings account

MODEL A ARCHEOLOGY

SEASON 1 RECAP

Hello! I am back from my "expedition" across the summer to dig up more clues from Annie's A. Unfortunately, in that time, priorities shifted on me and progress on the car came to zero. That ever happen to you before? The result is that I do not have the wealth of new material to report on that I thought I would. Soooo... just like the major television networks are currently doing in the wake of last summer's writers' guild strike, I will give you a "last season recap" of the articles that appeared in the Jan-May 2023 Script to help remind you of where we were in the saga of Annie's A. This will also give new readers a chance to binge read last season's material if they choose, and catch up with the full story and will give me a chance to gather up some new material. Like all the major TV networks, we will begin the new season of Model A Archeology after the Superbowl.

This is Annie's A. She is one of the 1,387,270 Standard Tudor Sedans (55A and 55B) produced from 1927-1931. Tudor Sedans represent 28.5% of total Model A worldwide production. What

makes this very common car special is that it has been in my family since 1947 and is an essentially "unmolested" car over those seventy-seven years. What makes this car special *to me* is that it is THE CAR that got me hooked on old cars. Annie's A has been in my life for as long as I can remember. Although we have very good knowledge of the car's history back to 1947, the years from 1931-1947 are a total mystery and 16 years is more than a lifetime in the lifespan of a typical car! I have always been interested in trying to puzzle together as much as I can about those missing sixteen years. "Model A Archeology" is what I am calling the process of



gently scraping away layers that have gone undisturbed since 1947 to hopefully reveal some clues about those missing sixteen years. *Part 1 of Model A Archeology was published in the January 2023 Script and goes into greater detail.*

I call this car Annie's A because from 1947-1958 it was owned and routinely driven by my father's aunt, Annie Brebis Mosch. *Part 2 of Model A Archeology was published in the February 2023 Script.* In this issue, I share the history of Annie and her husband Rudy, what their life was like and how they used the cars involved in this story. That is followed with how my dad came to be the next caretaker of this car and the light refurbishment he and my mom undertook in the early '60's. I wrap up with the story of my own time with this car and our Club's connection to this car eighteen years ago. It is a rare treat to have the personal connection with the people from the past who have made their own imprint on this special Model A.

Before tearing into this car willy-nilly, I have always been held back by the concern that the time-capsule qualities of this car are part of what makes it special. For me the nagging question has always been, "If I began a disassembly process, would I ruin something for the future that cannot be replaced?" There was a voice in the back of my mind shouting out: "They are only original once"! Part Three of Model A Archeology, published in the March 2023 Script wrestles with the Preserve, Conserve, Restore question and the merits of each. At the end of this installment I arrive at a conclusion that I know I can live with and am pleased that I took the time to think through these issues.

Part Four of Model A Archeology, published in the April 2023 Script

starts the digging process. It starts with some known facts regarding the car itself. Then some of the many guirks that are present in the car are identified. These guirks matter because they point out that although the car may not have changed much since 1947, it does have many discrepancies when measured against the MARC/MAFCA judging standards for 1931



authenticity. This is that "first sixteen years" problem showing up. Who knows what happened in those years? It's difficult to call the car "alloriginal." The most glaring contradictions on the car are the 1930 radiator shell, the right side-only spare tire mount and the apparent presence of (maybe) Lombard Blue paint on the firewall. Part Four of



Model A Archeology lays out all the new questions.

Last season wrapped up with Part Five of Model A Archeology, published in the May 2023 Script. A huge surprise occurred when I began researching assembly plant

codes. This is an identification mark that is relatively easy to locate. The code was applied at the time of final assembly and although enough is not known to use it to pinpoint date of manufacture, it does reveal where in the country the car was assembled. I have always associated Annie's A with New Jersey since that is where she lived.

The huge surprise was finding an assembly plant code for Vancouver, British Columbia. Is Annie's A Canadian? This issue of



Model A Archeology delves into that possibility. discusses some of the key differences between U.S. and Canadian production and fails to draw a definitive conclusion just yet on that topic.

At the end of Season 1 of Model A Archeology, I ended up with more new questions raised about Annie's A than answers discovered. I started with six big questions about the history of

the car that I was hoping to answer. By the end of the season, only one question was answered and six new questions had been added to the list. Going in to Season 2, here are the big twelve questions about Annie's A's missing history I am trying to answer:

- 1. When did Rudy buy this Model A?
- 2. Why does it have a '30 radiator shell when it is a '31 car?
- 3. Why the unusual right side fender spare mount?
- 4. Was the car originally painted in the 1931 Lombard Blue and Black combination?
- 5. Was the car in a wreck? Does that explain all the above or is there another reason?
- 6. Do I preserve or restore what I have? (The only question answered thus far).
- 7. Is Feb-Mar '31 the right date-range for assembly?
- 8. Is the surviving seat upholstery brown check or small brown check?
- 9. How does brown-check upholstery make sense with the date estimate?
- 10. Is the car Canadian? How does the Vancouver stamping make sense?
- 11. For partially assembled Ford bodies shipped to Canada, which assembly plant stamped their code into the frame rail?
- 12. Was anything extraordinary going on at either the Vancouver or Seattle assembly plants between October 1930 and March 1931 that could help explain Annie's A?

Next time, season two will kick off with: Model A Archeology Part 6. Annie's A: "The Doors... Not Jim Morrison's Band."

FORD'S GARAGE TO ADD 4 MORE MICHIGAN RESTAURANTS



Ford's Garage, the Dearborn hot spot just west of Ford World Headquarters, is expanding. With its 1920s service station and prohibition ambiance, the restaurant is known as a place for a burger and brew served with a side of automotive history.

Billy Downs, the franchise partner of the Dearborn location, which opened in 2017, announced plans for four more Ford's Garage restaurants to open.

People enjoy great food and energy in a restaurant that is comfortable, unpretentious, and unique to the casual dining space," Downs said in a news release. "As it turns out, the Ford Motor Company's rich history as one of America's most important manufacturing companies also translates to a pretty cool dining experience. I'm excited to be bringing more of the Ford's Garage experience to the Detroit area."

The second Michigan Ford's Garage is expected to open next year at the Fountain Walk in Novi. Construction on the Novi location is set to begin this month.

Site selection for the other three locations has also begun, according to a news release.

Ford's Garage was founded in 2012 in Ft. Myers, Florida, where Henry Ford had a winter home. Since then, it's grown to 20 franchise locations in Florida, Indiana, Michigan, Ohio, and Texas.

Ford's Garage is an official licensee of Ford Motor Co., which allows them to outfit the inside and exterior of the restaurants with Ford brand imagery, including the iconic Ford blue-oval logo.

While Ford's Garage restaurants are modeled after a 1920s service station, they're also filled with Ford memorabilia, including vintage fixtures and gas pumps, as well as a Model T or Model A car suspended above the center bar.

The restaurants are decidedly vintage, mixing Prohibition-style elements like brick, richly colored woods and a copper bar top that's hammered by hand.

While Ford's Garage is known for its half-pound, hand-patted, Black Angus beef burgers, the menu also offers comfort foods, entree selections, soups, salads, sandwiches and appetizers. It also has an extensive craft beer selection, wine and cocktails.
