While describing my situation others at Sully, I was told of bearing problems others had had. Sobering stories. I have no idea whether the bearing was too loose or too tight or had another kind of failure. The lesson is to check your wheels periodically. I typically do that, but had not done it recently.

The Great Race, from Owensboro, KY to Gardiner, Maine, went through our area. They spent the night in Frostburg, MD, and had lunch in Purcellville, VA. They spent the next night at the Gateway in Gettysburg. II had planned to go, but had gotten my days mixed up and thought they would spend the night of the 26th in Gettysburg, but it was the 25th. I had planned to go up on Wednesday afternoon, but I would have been a day late, so I dashed up on Tuesday afternoon, the 25th, to see some of the cars arrive. # A NOTE ON DAVE'S WOODIE

Dave did all the woodworking during restoration of the car. Of special Interest to me was the finger joint in the top rail of the wooden frame above his right shoulder. We have all seen boards at the big box stores where the factory pieced together longer planks from short boards with finger joints that are straight in line. On the car the left side top frame rail joint isn't straight, it angles to the right <u>and</u> down! Imagine working out those angles! Dave had a custom cutter that came with the project and used it with a Bridgeport mill, but it surely took many test pieces to learn technique. The jigs and fixtures that Ford used for all the woodwork on our cars must have been very innovative to be accurate and suitable for high production rates.

Attached is a brief writeup that I did for re: the judging at Sully. ## **SUMMER PICNIC**



### 2024 GREAT RACE

Last year at Model A Days at the Gilmore museum, one of the speakers was the executive director of The Great Race. I knew a little about the race from Hemmings and other publications and enjoyed hearing about the race.

The Great Race is open to cars that are 45 years old with original parts. Cars can be modified, but with primarily with period modifications. Points are awarded on how well a driver and navigator can match a time and average speed over a predetermined course. Points are also awarded on a handicap system that awards bonus points to older vehicles. When I learned that the 2024 Great Race was coming through our area, I wanted to make sure that I got to see some of it.

The 2024 Great Race originated in Owensboro, KY and ended in Gardiner, Maine. It started on June 22 in Owensboro. On June 24, the teams spent the night in Frostburg, MD and then headed for a lunch in Purcellville, VA, before ending up at the Gateway in Gettysburg, PA for the night of June 25. I marked my calendar, incorrectly, as it turned out, but made plans to go to Gettysburg to see the cars.

On June 23, Keith Randall of the V8 club notified the club that the race would go through Purcellville the next day on its way to Gettysburg. I had put Wednesday the 26th in my calendar to go to Gettysburg. I was able to make a last minute change to my schedule to head up on the 25th (one nice thing about being retired). Unfortunately, I had a meeting in Rockville that evening at 7, but I thought I would go up and see what I could see. On my way up Rte. 15 outside of Frederick, I passed two race participants, a late 48 Ford and a yellow Model A panel truck.

When I got to the Gateway, the site of the MARC meet a few years ago and an AACA meet pre-Covid, there were quite a few spectators, some of whom had bought their antique cars. I headed over to the "finish" line for the night and watched the cars arrive.

One of the vintage spectator cars was a 1929 Lincoln phaeton, unrestored. A wonderful car. I also saw a Hudson pickup, another favorite of mine.

I couldn't stay long enough to see too many cars cross the finish line, but I did see about half a dozen finish. I saw quite a few on Rte. 15 heading north on my way home.

As I couldn't stay as long as I wanted, I decided to get up early and head back to Gettysburg to see the racers before they left in the morning. That turned out to be a great idea. Most of the cars were in the parking lot of the Wyndham Hotel and many of their drivers and navigators were out there with them.

I talked to a few. One gentleman, Jeff Hermanson, from Culver, Indiana, races his 1939 Ford 1/2 ton truck. This is his 7th race. He entered his first race on a lark and has been hooked ever since.

I spoke to a young man who was with his father's 1931 Franklin. They had a problem with a driveshaft, but were able to source one from a restoration shop in Maryland and stay in the race. That car had an enormous engine.

There were probably more Fords than any other make in the race, from a 1926 Model T speedster to a 1969 Mustang Boss 302.

There were quite a few Model A's participating. I counted 12, one of the most popular cars, from speedsters to very stock looking cars. Ford V8s were numerous, as well.

The winner this year was a 1916 Hudson speedster driven by Howard and Doug Sharp. They are five time winners! For further info and lots of photos from the race, head to <u>greatrace.com</u>




## Jim's Tech Tips "Difficult Steering"

Many Model A owners find their car hard to steer when parking or maneuvering at low speed. After you confirm that there is oil in the steering gear box (not grease), the tires are all inflated to 35 psi, and everything on the front axle has been properly greased, you are left with the most likely cause: The spindle bolt (kingpin) "thrust bearings" are defective or they are not shimmed up properly to support the weight of the car. You can confirm this by using a floor jack to take some weight off of the front wheels, and then see if the steering effort is drastically reduced. If it is, the problem is the bearings.

To correct this, you need to remove everything from the spindles to get to the kingpins and remove them. See Les Andrews' Red Book, starting on page 1-209, for directions. The illustration below comes from later in that section.

Clean the thrust bearing and replace it if it does not turn smoothly or shows any signs of wear. Pack the bearing with grease before reinstalling.

When reassembling, you need to test fit the spindle with the kingpin fully locked in place with the locking pin. Temporarily leave the large felt seal and metal washer off of the bottom of the spindle for this. Start with the number of shims previously used, then add 1 shim at a time until very little or no vertical movement of the spindle is felt on the kingpin. It can take up to 4 shims to compensate for wear.



At some point, adding a shim may jam up the spindle, making it hard to turn on the kingpin. If it does, take that last shim out, reassemble, and confirm that the spindle again moves easily, as it should. Now reassemble the spindle on the axle with the felt seal and the cupped metal washer installed between the axle and the bottom part of the spindle (the metal cup touches the axle, the felt touches the spindle). The added thickness of the felt seal may temporarily make the spindle a bit stiff turning on the kingpin, but it will quickly flatten out and move smoothly when you drive.

Now reinstall everything that attaches to the spindle, install the brakes, maybe use this as an opportunity to clean and repack the wheel bearings, then install the drums and the wheels. Grease all of the fittings well. Go for a test drive, enjoy the easier steering, and *Have a Model A Day!*

#### "Make and Carry a Temporary Gas Gauge"

Every now and then you will come across a car or truck with an inoperable gas gauge. For example, the float sinks. You don't want to go driving around without knowing how much fuel you have in the tank.

Here are some basic instructions that you can use to make a temporary gas gauge, to use until the gauge is repaired. It's not a bad idea to carry it with you, to use on your car or to help someone traveling with you.

Take a simple paint stirring stick, like they give away at a paint store, and measure up from the end to mark the place indicating a Full tank. From there, you can use a ruler to estimate the  $\frac{1}{2}$ ,  $\frac{1}{4}$  and  $\frac{3}{4}$  levels. Score a line in the wood at these 4 places, and then darken each line with a black marker.

The gas tank changed design between 1928-29 and 1930-31. The '28-29 tank holds about 10 gallons, and the larger '30-31 tank holds about 11. That means that the distance to Full is slightly different between the two tanks.

I score and mark one side of the paint stirrer with the '28-29 height to Full of  $7\frac{1}{4}$ ", and then mark off the quarters from there. Then I do the same on the other side of the stick using the 1930-31 height to Full of  $8\frac{1}{2}$ ". Label each side. Now you have a stick that can be used on any year Model A.

To use it, remove the gas cap (and the screen in the filler neck, if the car has one) and just dip the stick straight down until you touch the bottom of the gas tank. Now lift it out and see where the wet gas level is on the gauge. It will be approximate, close enough to drive with some confidence, knowing you will have enough fuel.

I hope you never get stuck with an inoperative gas gauge, but if you do, now you can be prepared with this temporary stick gauge.


