The first problem we encountered was that the ferry to Tangier had stopped for the season. There was no indication of this on the web site and when we visited the marina where the ferry was docked, the office was closed and the boat was at the dock. Apparently, the restaurants on the island close in late October, so they suspend the ferry service for the season.

The second potential problem was that the motel, while clean, was very basic and there was no breakfast available nearby. If we were to use the motel, we would need to take care of our own breakfast and bring coffee and the like, so a little more preparation was involved. I identified a potential alternate hotel, but it had recently closed, so that was not available. There are not many hotel options in the area, so our choices were limited.

The final obstacle was that in confirming the Model A collection to visit, I was told that they wanted at least ten cars to make it worth their while to open it up. We had six cars, so under their minimum. I had been in touch with them multiple times and this requirement was never mentioned before.

I was very disappointed, but hopefully we can put the tour together next year with some more planning and inviting other clubs to join us. I went on a tour with the V8 club to the area last week and it was a lot of fun, so it is an area worth exploring in a tour.

REED MARTIN PASSES

Taken from Bluegrass Today

This remembrance of banjo player Reed Martin, who died on September 30 in Potomac, MD after a long stint with Alzheimer's Disease, is a contribution from his friends and family. He was 78 years of age.

Reed Martin was one of a kind, a rare breed of human that was beloved by untold people around the globe. Perhaps he described himself the best, so as he put it, Reed was "the last known translator of Kentucky and Hoosier," who "majored in bicycling, banjo, fishing, hanging out, and talking to older people who would stand still long enough." He collected things (vintage banjos, Model A and earlier vintage cars, antique spark plugs, circus giant rings, life-sized fiberglass bulls, tether cars and miniature model gasoline engines), but especially poignant were the stories and tales that went with each beloved object.

Reed was a masterful clawhammer banjo player who had an intricate, driving playing style, winning contests and inspiring generations of players to take up the instrument at numerous banjo camps and workshops across the country. Banjo players such as Jeremy Stevens, Russ Carson, Ned Luberecki, and Chris Coole count among those influenced by Reed in their formative years.

His self-released project, *Old Time Banjo*, consisting of 37 tunes recorded in Reed's living room in 1996 by Don Anderson, was considered a musical master work by many of his peers. Reed was also featured on various projects which include *The Old Time Banjo in America* (1979), *The Young Fogies* (1985), and more recently, Tom Mindte's *The Patuxent Banjo Project* (2014). While still in his early 20s, Reed was recruited by Ralph Rinzler to be the MC for the banjo workshops held at the Washington Folklife Festival, which he did for five years, featuring great players such as Dock Boggs, Don Stover, Buell Kazee, Kyle Creed, Fred Cockerham, Earl Scruggs, Wade Ward, and Libba Cotton, among many others.

Reed was a model maker working at the Smithsonian for a time. He and his buddies could, and did, make *anything*. In 1990, Reed shipped his single cylinder 1900 Knox three wheeler to England, where and he and his wife Barbara completed the 57 mile London to Brighton Veteran Car Run. First held in 1896, the London to Brighton Run is the world's oldest motoring event, open only to pre-1905 cars.

His favorite things were hanging out and playing tunes, working on antique cars and engines, going to yard sales, thrift shops and swap meets, canoeing and bicycling, and talking to anyone and everyone he met. He rode the 185 mile C&O Rail trail from Cumberland, MD to Georgetown, DC a dozen times just for fun.

Reed's beloved wife, Barbara Martin, died before him. His loss is felt by many friends from around the world, including the communities of old time banjo music, the Fairfax, VA, Model A Club, FARTS (Friends of Antique Road Transportation), Cabin John Association, CAMS (Chesapeake Area Metalworking Society), Smithsonian Folklore Society, and collectors and curmudgeons of all stripes.

Family and friends will be hosting a musical celebration of Reed at Glen Echo Park in Glen Echo, MD in the spring of 2025.

New member Ed Ables earned accolades as the man inside the trailer, lifting, moving, placing parts on what turned out to be a warm fall day. He was ably assisted by Bruce Metcalf and Rick Reale. Meanwhile inside, Luke Chaplin, Swap Meet Champion, was selecting small parts while others, including the Kichlines, were moving parts identified with special ribbon to indicate they had been previously identified.

At the end of the loading, Stan thanked the loading crew for performing a project that a few days before had looked

impossible. The next challenge was to get the loaded trailer to Michigan. Club President Milford Sprecher arrived back in the DC area in time to hook up to the trailer and tow it to Hickory Corners, Michigan, the site of the Model A Museum.

On Thursday, September 19, a group of MAFFI volunteers unloaded the trailer and placed the items in a display for sale. At a gathering at the end of the Model A Day celebration, the operator of the MAFFI swap meet space presented an envelope containing over \$800 from sales at the site. This more than covered the cost of the trailer to move the parts. Many items still remain from the Bratton donation, which will be offered for sale at coming events at the museum. An outcome that was magical, performed by our George Washington Club. Thank you all!

THE RESTORATION OF THE MODEL A BUS FOR THE GILMORE

I had known about this bus, a 1931 Model AA passenger bus, for many years, but never did I think I would ever get a chance to own it! Lee Roy Hartung owned many Model A's, but this old bus caught my eye. I thought it would be cool to own a Model A bus and take the whole family for a ride in it.

Lee Roy passed away in 2011 and I went to look at his estate on display prior to the auction. He was a great collector and had bicycles, license plates, motorcycles, old cars, world's fair collectibles and Model A Fords.

I went home and told my wife that I could possibly bid on a Model A bus and she said, "Go ahead!" I almost fell off my chair and immediately went to the bank to make arrangements.

Lots of Model A's were being sold and the prices were very high, so I expected that the same would happen to the bus. To my surprise, there were only two of us bidding and I made the top bid of \$4,500 and \$5,300 out the door, including taxes. I couldn't have been happier as I now owned a bus that I had been looking at for over 40 years. I had to hire a flat bed to take it home because the back wheels were frozen because the barn flooded every time there was a heavy rain.

While I owned the bus, my friend Tim Stegenga replaced a broken rear main leaf spring, the rear backing plants and all the brakes and wheels on the back as they were completely rusted away. Thanks to Tim, we drove the bus out of my barn in 2015 in front of a big crowd of people attending our Model A and T parts swap meet held each year on my front lawn. We had an exciting ride around my driveway with rust and dirt flying as we rode.

After owning the bus and enjoying driving it, I was in my mid-seventies and wondered, "What am I going to do with the bus now?" I knew that I could not afford to restore it. I thought about the sister bus in Greenfield Village at the Henry Ford Museum. Their bus gives rides to visitors daily in Greenfield Village. In fact, in 2019, it gave rides to 37,000 visitors. I thought this was a wonderful thing to do. I then had the idea of donating the bus to our fantastic Model A museum, with the intent of using it to give rides to visitors of the famous Gilmore Museum. A great idea, but it needed a full restoration, so we developed a plan.

First we asked for donations of a rebuilt engine and we found a Model A club willing to rebuild the chassis. If we could get a lot of help and money, we could actually restore the bus! Counting on our Model A family to step up and help complete this crazy restoration project. It sounded like a good idea, but would our community step up and support the project? All we could do was to try and see what happened!

The donations starting coming in and everyone seemed to like the idea. People asked how they could help and said they wished they lived closer so they could help us.

We started to sell t-shirts and sweatshirts to help raise money. Tim Stegenga, who is a good friend of Jay Leno, arranged for us to raffle two airline tickets for a visit with Jay. This helped us

raise enough to get the project started and we were on our way!

I was looking for someone to help restore the chassis. I called Don Temple and Grier Fleischhauer in North Carolina and they agreed to restore the entire chassis. The Coastal Carolina A's stepped up and provided the labor to get this job done. In about a year, they were ready for us to pick up a completely restored long wheelbase 157" chassis. They kicked the project into high gear with this fast turnaround and we went down to attend a great cookout and pick up a restored chassis. The body, floor, windows, hood and other parts were restored in my shop, the Forty Horse Farm, with help from the Napier A's. Finally the bus was completed in time for an unveiling at Model A Days at the Gilmore Museum in September 2024.

Many thanks to all the people who helped bring this project to fruition by donating money, time and parts to allow us to complete this restoration. The GWC donated a high compression cylinder head to the project. COLD WEATHER STORAGE TIPS

Looks like the cooler weather may finally be working its way in. Holidays are here and the old cars will be put away for the winter. Here are a few tips to make sure your Model A is stored properly and will be ready to go again next spring.

- -Make sure your gas tank is full. This will reduce the amount of moisture that can be absorbed into your fuel system. This also reduces the rate at which gasoline will turn to varnish. Like I'm always saying, use "Ethanol Free" fuel, especially for storage.
- -Use Anti-freeze. Not only will this keep your engine from freezing, but it will also keep rust from forming in your cooling system.
- -Wash the car and apply a good wax. Don't forget to clean the interior too. Do this early in the day so it will have plenty of time to dry before you put it in the garage.
- -If you have a convertible top, leave it up. Convertible tops can develop some nasty creases when stored in the down position. Also store your car with the windows up tightly to prevent any insects or varmints from getting inside. Don't forget to make sure your floorboards are in place for the same reason.
- -Now, take the car for a nice drive, 30 minutes or so, to get all the moisture from the engine and exhaust system before it is put away for the winter. This will also help keep rust at bay.
- -Change the engine oil before storage. Dirty oil is contaminated with acids and moisture which can cause premature damage to your engine. If you believe your car is going to sit for a year or more, then remove the spark plugs and pour some "upper cylinder lubricant" into the engine. I like Marvel Mystery Oil for this.
- -If you are storing your car in the basement or other damp location, then I would recommend spraying some WD-40 on all exposed metal surfaces under the hood and chassis. Don't even bother wiping it off, just spray it on to keep the rust away.
- -To keep flat spots from forming on your tires, over inflate them slightly, or put the car up on Jack stands if possible.
- -Keep that battery charged. A fully discharged battery will go bad in just a few days. Use a low amperage "Battery Tender" if you have one, or charge the battery every few weeks. Keep the battery disconnected during storage by removing the fuse, or one of the battery cables.
- -The best thing you can do for any car in storage is to visit it at least once per month and take it out for a nice drive. This will keep the battery charged and all your mechanical parts moving like they are supposed to. This is not only good for the car, but good for the owner as well.
