FROM THE EDITOR



Youth: Thomas Adcock will be attending the University of Tennessee majoring in aerospace engineering. Congratulations!


Script: Bill thanked the members for the articles and the next deadline is March 3.

HOW TO START A LONG DORMANT ANTIQUE CAR ENGINE **INITIAL INSPECTION And** PREPARATION



Inspect and remove foreign objects from the intake manifold, air cleaner, exhaust pipe, radiator, water jacket, and clutch housing Clear debris from the area around the vehicle, lubricate hood and door hinges

Gas Tank may be rusted, clogged or filled with stale fuel. Drain and refill OR use a substitute tank.

GET THE CRANKSHAFT TO ROTATE 360 DEGREES

- 1. Make sure the transmission is in neutral
- 2. Or put it in high gear and rock the car back and forth
- 3. Try to turn the crankshaft pulley with a wrench (CW not CCW) or crank.
- 4. If it won't turn, try to find the cause of blockage or "freezing"
- 5. Pour Marvel Mystery Oil into spark plug holes (or acetone, evapo-rust, transmission fluid, vinegar, etc.).
- 6. Try to use force to turn the engine over 360 degrees
- 7. If you can manually rotate the engine 360 degrees, then try the starter.

IF IT WON'T ROTATE, THE HARD DECISION . . . SIGNIFICANT DISSASSEMBLY

7

- 1. Remove the head to assess and repair a. Condition of pistons and cylinders
 - b. Condition of valves
 - c. Hone cylinders, wire brush pistons
 - d. Unstick frozen valves
 - e. Reface valves and seats
- 2. Remove the oil pan to assess and repair.
 - a. Search for any physical blockage
 - b. Check tightness of bearings
 - c. Look up into cylinders for rust or debris
- 3. Remove starter

Apply force – pry bar on flywheel teeth; pound wooden block on pistons; extra leverage on breaker bar: heat





ONCE UNSTUCK, STARTING A DORMANT ENGINE

Before attempting to start the engine:

- Check and replace
 - Pour one quart down the distributor opening
- fluids like oil and coolant
- Ensure a blockage-free fresh fuel supply
 Provide a strong battery with sufficient charge
- Add a few drops of oil into each cylinder through the spark plug holes
- Check for any potential issues with the ignition system and belts before attempting to start.

ADDITIONAL STEPS IN STARTING AN ENGINE

Look at everything, a "pre-flight" inspection

In advance of firing, try to get oil to all the bearings and guides.

Running the starter with the ignition off primes the oil pump.

Don't abuse your starter. Crank no more than 10 seconds and wait a minute or so to avoid overheating.

If fuel, ignition and compression are correct, the engine will respond quickly. *Hope* should not play a role.

IGNITION TIMING FOR A MODEL A FORD

<u>Retard</u> the ignition timing lever to the maximum extent (push up)

Unscrew the camshaft <u>timing screw</u>, invert it and put the rounded end back into the hole.

Turn the engine until the timing pin drops into the indent in the camshaft gear.

At this point the piston in <u>cylinder number 1</u> is at top dead center (TDC)

Loosen the screw holding the points cam to the distributor shaft

Move the points cam until the points are just opening.


Set points gap at .020 (matchbook cover thickness)

Tighten the points screw and the cam screw

Adjust the spark lever









Tom Terko

June 8, 1950 – February 9, 2025

TOM TERKO – MASTER MECHANIC



Tom Terko, one of our Club's master mechanics, passed away age 74 on February 9, 2025. Thomas Howard Terko was born June 8, 1950 in Washington, DC, the son of Howard and Mary Terko.

Tom joined our Club in 2002, and was very quickly active on the Board of Directors, as Technical Director, in 2005.

Tom quickly established his mechanical expertise in the Club in this position, and in 2006, was selected to receive our Carl

Patrick Award. The report in the January 2006 Ford Script tells the story:

"Tom Terko was selected for the award, as a result of his volunteer efforts to help out several club members who were just not in a position to get things taken care of by themselves. Tommy showed up, on some occasions unannounced, and brought direction and purposefulness to the effort. He doesn't work with a lot of fanfare and bull, he just applies his skills and gets it done. These traits undoubtedly come from the many years that he was responsible for the reliability

and safety of the Montgomery County, Maryland, school busses."

Tom was an avid antique auto collector, with a particular affinity for Model A and Model T Fords. His favorite was his 1927 Model T Roadster that was just like the car his grandfather owned, the car in which he learned to drive.

Tom also owned an award-winning 1929 Model A Ford Town Sedan, and 2 other early model Fords. He was an active member of many local Ford Model A and T clubs and found purpose in helping the other members of those car clubs



work on their cars. He was also active in helping organize events and run those car clubs.

The last few years, he spoke of the great times and fond memories he had volunteering to help set up and run the antiques/old timers section of the Montgomery County (MoCo) Fair. He was also an active member of the Friends of the Montgomery County Farm Park.

Tom graduated Wheaton High School, class of 1969, and furthered his education at a trade school in Baltimore where he learned auto mechanics. He spent his career working for the Montgomery County Department of Transportation where he was a supervisor. After retirement, he started an auto body shop in Hyattsville and worked part time at Bratton's Antique Auto Parts in Mt. Airy.



An avid gun collector, at one point he owned a variety of firearms. He was an active member of the Greenbelt Gun Club, where he was a sharpshooter. And, although he never completed the full course, he had worked to obtain his private pilot's license, and told me several times how much he enjoyed flying.

Tom lived a very full and active life and found joy in helping others. He never did anything for anyone with the expectation of getting something in return and always tried to give more than he got.

He is survived by his beloved wife of 34 years, Carol, son Ryan and a granddaughter, Mia (who was the light of his life), and numerous cousins and other family members.

We are pleased to be able to honor Tom on this year's Sully pin:

STARTING TOM TERKO'S MODEL A

At the February meeting we had a great presentation by Stan Johnson on getting a dormant Model A started. That was a good refresher as I was tasked with getting Tom Terko's Model A started so it could be driven to his visitation on Feb 23. I have had a fair amount of practice starting cars that would not start, including Reed Martin's car, a couple of Club member's cars and First Start cars at Model A Days, so I thought I was up for the task.



The last time I had seen Tom's Model A, it was in Tom's garage, but it had been parked outside at some point in the last couple of years in one of those metal framed tents so his Mercedes 380SL could be moved inside. It was a bit tough to get to, as it had a car cover and some other tarps on it.

My initial task was to charge the battery. My charger indicated that the Optima battery it had was still good. I put the charger on it and it wasn't really taking the charge. I then took the battery out, cleaned the cables and terminals and charged it out of the car, which was succeeding.

I know Tom was pretty good about putting Stabil in his gas, so I removed the gas cap and the gas didn't smell bad. I turned the shutoff valve on and I could smell bad gas dripping out of the carb. While I was waiting for the battery to charge, I drained about 2 1/2 gallons of honey-colored gas out of the tank. I also removed the sediment bowl and drained the bad gas out and cleaned the bowl. The battery still had time to charge, so I left it to return on the following day.

When I got back the following day, the battery was charged, so I put it back in the car and connected the cable. I had a couple of gallons of fresh gas, so I put that in the tank. I also drained the bad gas out of the carb. The engine turned over with the starter, but did not start. I then checked out the voltage from the starter to the terminal box and coil and to the points. They all read 5.7 volts, not full charge, but probably good enough to start the car. I did not have spark through the points when I cranked it over.

I filed the points, still no spark. I got alcohol and a Q tip and cleaned the points (they were dirty). Still no spark. I filed the points again. Still no spark. At this point, I decided to go home and get new points and condenser just in case. I replaced the condenser because it was easy (not a good diagnostic technique) I took the distributor body off and noticed that the spark plugs were loose. I guess Tom had put some oil in the cylinders. I tightened them up.

The starter was not cranking the engine very fast, so I thought it made sense to check the ground on the battery cable, so I loosened that to make sure that it had adequate ground. I then checked the coil wire for fire when the switch was turned on the points closed, getting a good solid spark at the grounded coil wire when I opened the points. I then filed the points one more time, more aggressively than before and adjusted the points. I finally got spark through the points, so I buttoned it back up and went inside the car to try and start it again. It immediately

fired and quit. I did that a few more times and I got it to run and it ran very well. I ran to check the coolant and didn't see any. I added almost a gallon of coolant and let it run for a while.

The car was on jack stands, so I removed those and filled the tires with air. It was getting late and I had a lawn tractor to move out of the way, so I got that running and moved so I could

move the car when it was time. Tom's son came over and cleaned the car so it would look as good as it could for the visitation. The day of the visitation, I was able to drive it to the funeral home and park out front so visitors could see it.

The car drives and runs well and, as usual, I attracted a good bit of attention on the way to and from the visitation.



TRIVIA

(Taken from the 1981 copy of the Guinness Book of World Records and reprinted from the April 1982 Ford Script.)

Charles Creighton and James Hargis of Maplewood, MO, drove their Ford Model A 1929 Roadster in <u>reverse</u> from NYC to Los Angeles (3,340 miles), July 26-Aug. 13, 1930, <u>without</u> <u>stopping</u> the engine once. They arrived back in NY on Sept. 5, again in reverse, thus completing 7,180 miles in 42 days.

Cliff Green

August 23, 1938 -- February 18, 2025



Donald Clifton "Cliff" Green, 86, of Fairfax Station, VA, passed away peacefully on February 18, 2025. Cliff was born on August 23, 1938, in Fairhaven, MA, to Donald and Nancy Ericson Green.

Cliff was a member of the GWC from 2013 until 2023. You may also remember that he was an instigator for many of us Model A folks to join the Northern Virginia Regional Group Ford V-8 club, where he was the trophy man for the annual NVRG annual Armed Forces Day car show in Fairfax. He encouraged those of us with Model As to join in their show, and encouraged me to sponsor a trophy specifically for Model As. In return, he was a strong advocate in the NVRG to bring their stunning cars to Sully, and to help us with judging.

Cliff's 1940 Ford Deluxe Woody Station Wagon was a meticulously restored masterpiece, one he shared with us every year at Sully, like in this shot from 2015. His skill rebuilding the fickle Early Ford V-8 distributor was extraordinary. He was a charter member of the Northern Virginia Regional Group, and recognized nationally as a Woody expert. He was also a great personal friend for over 20 years

Cliff graduated from Boston University where he was a



member of the varsity crew team. Upon graduation, he attended Naval Officer School in Pensacola, FL, and earned his wings. Cliff was Sandra's "Top Gun," as he was a fighter pilot assigned to the famed Jolly Rogers VF-84 Fighter Squadron, based out of Oceana NAS in Virginia Beach and assigned to the USS Independence. After his tour of duty, Cliff went on to have a long and fulfilling career as a pilot with American Airlines. He was based in Washington, D.C., and they made their home in Fairfax Station, VA, for decades.

Outside of his career, Cliff was a man of many talents and interests. As a charter member of the Northern Virginia Early V-8 Club, he served in many capacities for decades. He enjoyed restoring classic Fords, particularly the vintage flathead models, as well as antique clocks and furniture. He also enjoyed building things for the grandchildren, designing and building Lionel train layouts, and doing numerous other woodworking projects.

Together, Cliff and Sandra enjoyed a life of family, travel, ski trips, golfing with friends, and spending winters in Amelia Island, FL. They loved gardening on their property and created an

oasis in the woods behind their home of 42 years. Each morning, he began his day walking the azalea paths through the woods with his beloved shelties.

Cliff was known for his kind heart and his willingness to always lend a hand and help others, and his unshakable loyalty to his family and friends. He found joy in the simple things and always had a story to tell. He leaves behind a lasting legacy of love, laughter, and inspiration.

He is survived by his cherished wife of 62 years, Sandra; his daughter, Tracy Green Foster and her husband Rick Webb; his son, Russell Green and his wife Mary Green; his grandchildren, Shane Foster, Jordan Green, Noelle Foster, Jackson Green, and Charlie Green; as well as numerous extended family members and friends who will miss him dearly.

On March 22, 2025, at 12:00 p.m., friends and family are invited to gather in the reception room located in the Fairfax Memorial Funeral Home. At 1:00 p.m., attendees will proceed by car to a graveside service on the grounds of Fairfax Memorial Gardens. Immediately afterwards, attendees are invited back to the funeral home's reception room where there will be a celebration of Cliff's life.

We are encouraged to drive our early Ford V8s or Model As to the funeral home for Cliff's funeral and celebration of life – he surely loved our old cars.

In lieu of flowers, the family suggests a donation be made to the Pulmonary Fibrosis Foundation.

SUGARLOAF AACA HEATER TOUR

The Heater Tour is an annual tour put on by the Sugarloaf Mountain Region of AACA around this time of year. I had participated in one about ten years ago and my 1930 Model A was far and away the oldest car on the tour. This year the tour was of some historic stone bridges in Washington County, MD, so I was interested in going. I got Tom Terko's Model A running on the Friday before, so I was able to join the tour on Saturday, Feb. 22.

Washington County has quite a few stone bridges, all of similar design. The best known is Burnside Bridge on the Antietam battlefield. If you are familiar with that bridge, you have an idea of what the others look like.

The county has a brochure called The Bridges of Washington County, MD, which includes 22 different bridges located in the county with a short description of each one.

We met at the McDonalds at the Myersville exit off I-70 in Frederick County. There were seven or so vehicles who met up for the tour, the oldest of which was a 1965 Corsair, so it was a pretty modern bunch. I drove my not quite antique Mazda Miata.

The length of the tour was 39 miles from the starting point with an estimated travel time of 1 1/2 hours. The tour included eight of the county's stone bridges. We didn't stop at any of the bridges, but continued on. The tour ended at the National Road Museum in Boonsboro.

The bridges included in the tour, in order, were Fellfoot Bridge, Pry's Mill Bridge, Hitt Bridge, Roxbury Mill Bridge, Rose's Mill Bridge, Claggett's Mill Bridge, Booth's Mill Bridge, and Devil's Backbone Bridge. The oldest bridge, at around 200 years, was the Roxbury Mill bridge and the youngest was Pry's Mill, built in 1858.

At the end of the tour, we stopped at the National Road Museum in Boonsboro, a small, but very well done, museum that featured the history of the National Road. When we were finished, we were on our own to tour Boonsboro and get some lunch. Author Nora Roberts has purchased a number of buildings in Boonsboro and has a few businesses, including a bookstore run by her husband.

About two thirds of the way through the tour, we drove by my grandparents' house where my father was born in Tilghmanton/Fairplay, which was an extra treat for me.

WINTER PROGRESS

Winter is finally approaching its end; have you all been busy on indoor (in garage) projects? I have! In the last two months, I have accomplished the following on my Deluxe Tudor: replaced the instrument panel and under-hood wiring; rebuilt the water pump and replaced the dangerous original fan with a cast one; replaced the whole fuel line system and installed electric fuel shut off; rebuilt and installed a "pressure balanced" Zenith carb; and tested and installed the "red ball" inside motometer that I acquired at Hershey and showed at the November meeting.

The "redball" motometer was an in-the-car temperature gauge available during Model A production. I saw this one at the Hershey flea market last October. The capillary tube between the meter and probe is often broken, but this one looked OK, so I took a chance. But does it work? I set a pot of water on the stove and put the probe in it along with a lab thermometer and started heating. It worked fine; notable points are as follows:

bottom of driving range- 120 degrees middle of driving range- 150 degrees top of driving range---- 180 degrees touches peg----- 200 degrees red flag rises---- water starting to boil!

Now that I knew it worked, I replaced the wire to the internal lamp and made a new strap to clamp it to the steering column. Originally, the probe mounted in an adapter to put in the upper radiator hose, but I did not have that piece, so I had to make something. I used a repro water outlet that has a fitting for a temp probe or heater hose and mounted that when I rebuilt the water pump. Then I needed to do some lathe work to some brass plumbing pieces from Ace hardware to fit the original probe threads. The last part was mounting it all up, which took most of a day to do (I blame my hand issues for that!). So now for some pictures:


